give private parties and some have not yet decided on details, dates and partner hosts.

Conversations with various mothers indicate that parents whose daughters are not widely acquainted in the current debutante class may be reluctant to give expensive parties for virtual strangers.

The club has invited girls from various high schools to join in the last couple of years, but this year at least the University school girls still outnumber the others by two or three to one.

Other high schools from which this year's deb's are graduating include University Lake school, Hartland; Whitefish Bay, Nicolet, Dominican and Riverside.

Parties are becoming more expensive, partly because the deb classes are getting larger. In 1964, there were 38 deb's, in 1965, 59. Indications are that this year there will be more than 60.

This trend, initiated by the Service club with the most democratic intentions, means parents with limited funds must team up as hosts, entertain modestly or entertain not at all. A luncheon for 60 girls and 60 mothers, or a dance for 60 girls and 60 dates can be prohibitively expensive.

Some deb's want their own party, but do not want to be restricted to the debutante class as guess. Especially if most of their friends are "on the outside," they would like to vary the guest list.

All this seems to indicate that though the charity balls are going on much as usual, the individual debut parties are changing character.
